Overview

Clinical Ethics: Debates, Decisions, Solutions Ethical challenges facing health professionals have never been more important or more numerous. From health privacy and end-of-life issues to the role of ethics committees, it is clear that bioethics — and bioethics education — must be assigned the greatest possible roles in the daily lives of individual professionals and their institutions.

Course Objectives

Upon completion of this program participants will

- Have a better understanding of the role and importance of bioethics in clinical and institutional decision making, especially regarding privacy, access to care and end-of-life issues.
- Be better able to identify ethical challenges and issues in clinical practice, health law, guardianship and the role of institutional ethics committees.
- Be better able to articulate ethically optimized solutions in clinical and social contexts.

Audience

This course is designed for nurses, physicians, social workers, lawyers, clergy, psychologists, health administrators, philosophers and others with an interest or a need for continuing education in health ethics.


