In the half-century since cardiopulmonary resuscitation was devised, it has evolved from an experimental procedure designed to rescue near-drowning and near-electrocution victims to an ubiquitous intervention that has altered our view of death, dying and the limits of medical care.

Dr. Jude was a co-originator of CPR in the mid-1950s while at the Johns Hopkins University. He since has held positions at the University of Miami School of Medicine (where he is now a Clinical Professor of Surgery) and other institutions.
