The moral status of the human embryo is central to past and contemporary debate on the ethics of cloning, embryo research, stem cell research, genetic engineering and other leading research and therapy issues. A basic problem in the debate on the moral status of the embryo is that it lacks a coherent translation to the law. This presentation will illustrate a European approach to this challenge by comparing the moral status of human embryos with the currently changing attitude towards the moral status of certain animal embryos and its implications.

Mr. Faltus is project coordinator and research associate at the research project "GenomELECTION" (Genome Editing – Ethical, Legal and Communication Aspects in Molecular Medicine and Crop Plant Engineering) at Martin Luther University Halle-Wittenberg in Halle, Germany, and funded by the German Federal Ministry for Education and Research. He also specializes in legal issues related to embryo and stem cell research, and has advised the European Medicines Agency.
